ELECTION PROTECTION **YOU HAVE THE RIGHT TO VOTE**

EXERCISE YOUR RIGHT TO VOTE!

Attention North Carolina Voters! The right to vote is a fundamental right. As a registered voter, you are entitled to cast your ballot and have it counted! If you feel your rights have been violated, please call our toll free hotline: **1-866-OUR-VOTE (1-866-687-8683)**. To make the voting process easier, here are a few things to remember:

1. **When can I vote?** You can vote between 6:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m. If you are in line at 7:30 p.m., you have the right to vote.
2. **Am I eligible?** To vote in the state of North Carolina, you must:
 - Be a citizen of the United States (Includes those persons born in Puerto Rico, Guam and the U.S. Virgin Islands).
 - Have been a resident of the county and precinct in which you intend to vote for thirty (30) days.
 - Be at least eighteen (18) years of age on or before the date of the next general election.

If you have been convicted of a felony and completed your sentence of imprisonment, including any term of parole or probation for the conviction, and you have re-registered to vote, you are eligible to vote.

If you are a student, present in North Carolina for the purposes of attending school, and do not intend to return to your former home after graduation, you are eligible to vote.

3. **I'm registered. How do I vote?** As a registered voter, you can vote by regular ballot without presenting any form of identification. An election official may ask you to confirm your birth date.
 - If you have moved to a different precinct within North Carolina in the last 30 days, you may vote by regular ballot at your old precinct, or vote by provisional ballot at your new precinct. If your new precinct is in the same district, you can vote a regular ballot.
 - You DO NOT need to have your voter registration identification card with you when you cast your ballot.
 - You can take minor children under the age of 18 into the voting booth with you.

4. **What if this is my first time?**

- You can vote by regular ballot. If you **registered by mail and have not previously provided photo identification**, you will need to bring some form of identification. Please remember to bring ONE of the following forms of identification: driver's license, student, employee or military ID, U.S. passport, a current utility bill, bank statement, government check or paycheck that shows your name and address, or any other government document that shows name and address.
- If you **do not have photo identification and did not previously include a copy of your identification with your voter registration application**, you can still vote by provisional ballot.

If you cast a provisional ballot, please call **1-866-OUR-VOTE** to verify what steps are needed to ensure that it is counted.

5. **What if I need help?** If you are blind, disabled, or cannot read or write, you may be assisted by a person of your choice or an election official. Your person of choice cannot be your employer or agent of your employer or an officer or agent of your union.
 - If you cannot read English you also may be assisted by a person of your choice.
 - If you are disabled or 65 years of age or older, and your assigned polling place is not accessible, you have the option to vote with assistance from within the vehicle that brought you to the polling site or at the door of the polling place.
